#### Implementation Risks and Considerations

#### Copyright Centre of Expertise

- · A significant degree of uncertainty exists with respect to the future of copyright in Canada
- The copyright landscape is changing at a rapid pace; assumptions and decisions made today may not be valid in 6-12 months
- Threat of litigation for non-compliance is a serious risk to those institutions who opted out of the Access Copyright model license
- There may be resistance to UBC offering services to other institutions, and fear that their issues would not receive the same attention or priority as UBC's
- · The needs of institutions may vary greatly and a risk of cost or use inequity exists
- · Copyright issues are often highly time sensitive and a shared service may not be responsive enough to meet institution deadlines
- UBC has invested in human resources, technology and other infrastructure to meet its own copyright clearance and compliance requirements; additional
  investments will be required to accommodate the needs of those institutions who use the shared service
- · Service Level Agreements (SLAs) will need to be determined to ensure institutions will receive appropriate prioritization and attention
- · A pilot approach involving a smaller number of institutions to test out the shared service and identify issues would reduce risk and disruption

#### Shared Legal Services

- · Some institutions may prefer to seek out their own independent legal advice; fewer participating institutions may lower the discounts obtained
- The copyright working group that was recently formed in B.C could work together with stakeholders to determine requirements and negotiate a joint contract
  with a single legal firm

#### Joint procurement of Rights Management Software

- BCELN could work with libraries to help determine which institutions will participate and to standardize requirements to allow for negotiation of a joint contract.
- · Individual institutions would be responsible for implementation and integrating the rights management software with existing technology as needed

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
# LOCR - Copyright Workflow

- distinguish between Fair Dealing, Permissions, Public Domain, and Licensed materials
- auto-generated cover sheets
- system deletes PDFs 30 days after course end



# LOCR - Instructor Course Home





# Working with SFU

- The Bookstore and CODE are happy with the service and do not report any concerns with the work done by UBC. Both units intended to use multiple sources for copyright clearances, with UBC being just one choice of many. However, during the trial CODE was sufficiently pleased with the UBC Service that they now send all their copyright clearances for textual materials through the UBC service.
- Overall SFU has been very pleased with the level of service provided by UBC and is eager to continue this mutually beneficial relationship.

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# Shared Service - Description

The Shared Permissions Service provides expertise in processing and obtaining copyright permissions for course instruction needs at partner institutions in British Columbia. We can:

- Contact rightsholders and obtain permissions on your behalf
- Track requests and escalate requests with non-responsive rightsholders
- Pay all required invoices and send you a single invoice
- Manage your records securely in our permissions database

Our services are intended to support your operations so you can focus on managing and delivering requested content.



# Shared Service - Challenges

Clearing permissions can be challenging work:

- The rightsholder denies permission for the amount requested or the intended use case
- The organization holding the copyright for the work no longer exists.
- Publisher is slow to respond and does not hold the copyright requiring a permission request to a new party
- The rightsholder cannot be located



# Shared Service – Expanding from SFU

## Example 1: 100% FTEs participating

Institution A with 7,000 FTE - 7,000 x 3.34 = 2,380 - Participation cost Institution B with 1,500 FTE - 1,500 x 3.34 = 510 - Participation cost 600 minimum

## Example 2: 75% FTEs participation

Institution A with 7,000 FTE - 7,000 x \$.47 = \$3,290 - Participation cost Institution B with 1,500 FTE - 1,500 x \$.47= \$705 - Participation cost

# **Example 3: 50% FTEs participating**

Institution A with 7,000 FTE - 7,000 x .70 = 4,900 - Participation cost Institution B with 1,500 FTE - 1,500 x .70 = 1,050 - Participation cost



# Moderated Knowledge Base

- Interested Universities jointly retain a law firm
- The firm establishes a confidential website accessible to institutional copyright leads, including:
  - Discussion Forum
  - Mechanism to refer questions a lawyer for advice
  - Repository/Archive
    - Legal advice given
    - Vetted discussion threads and answers
- Each university contributes to the costs
